

The Detroit River International Crossing Study June 2008 Public Information Open Houses

Teams of experts in both Canada and the United States have been working diligently on the Detroit River International Crossing study, developing a coordinated study framework and completing technical studies on Practical Alternatives within the Area of Continued Analysis. In Canada, the DRIC study team has completed its studies and is now seeking public input on the technically and environmentally preferred option.

The Canadian study team has been focused on completing specific technical studies of the Practical Alternatives originally announced in March 2006 and the Parkway alternative presented in August 2007. We continue to work closely with the community to both meet the purpose of the study – to provide for the safe, efficient and secure movement of people and goods across the Canadian-U.S. border in the Windsor-Detroit corridor – and to achieve the local community's goals of:

- o Improving quality of life
- Taking trucks off local streets
- Improving the movement of traffic across the border.

We're listening to you. In fact, nearly 300 public consultation sessions have been held since the beginning of the study with thousands of Windsor-Essex County residents, community groups, experts, local elected officials, and other government agencies.

Community input is key to understanding the community and environmental impacts so that we can minimize them wherever possible. This input has helped identify important concerns to be considered in the development and evaluation of alternatives.
